

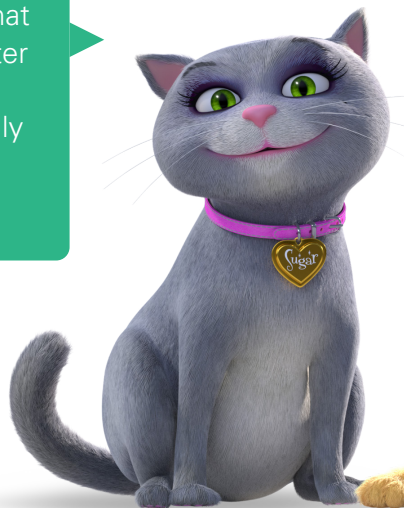
SUGAR & SPIKE ARE SPREADING THE WORD ABOUT DIABETES

A pet with diabetes may give you a sign - or several:

- Increased thirst
- Frequent urination
- Weight loss with or without increased appetite

Certain pets are at greater risk for Diabetes:

- Being a neutered male cat
- Being a middle aged or an older dog or cat
- Being obese (especially cats)

Here are some of the ways you can help to protect your pet's health:

Healthy diet

- Follow the nutrition advice provided by your veterinarian

Regular exercise

- Engage your pet through daily play and/or regular walks
- Consider using food puzzles or puzzle feeders especially if your pet needs to lose weight
- Make sure you have plenty of toys and somewhere for your pet to play
